Actively **advocate** for the advancement of the touring and presenting field.

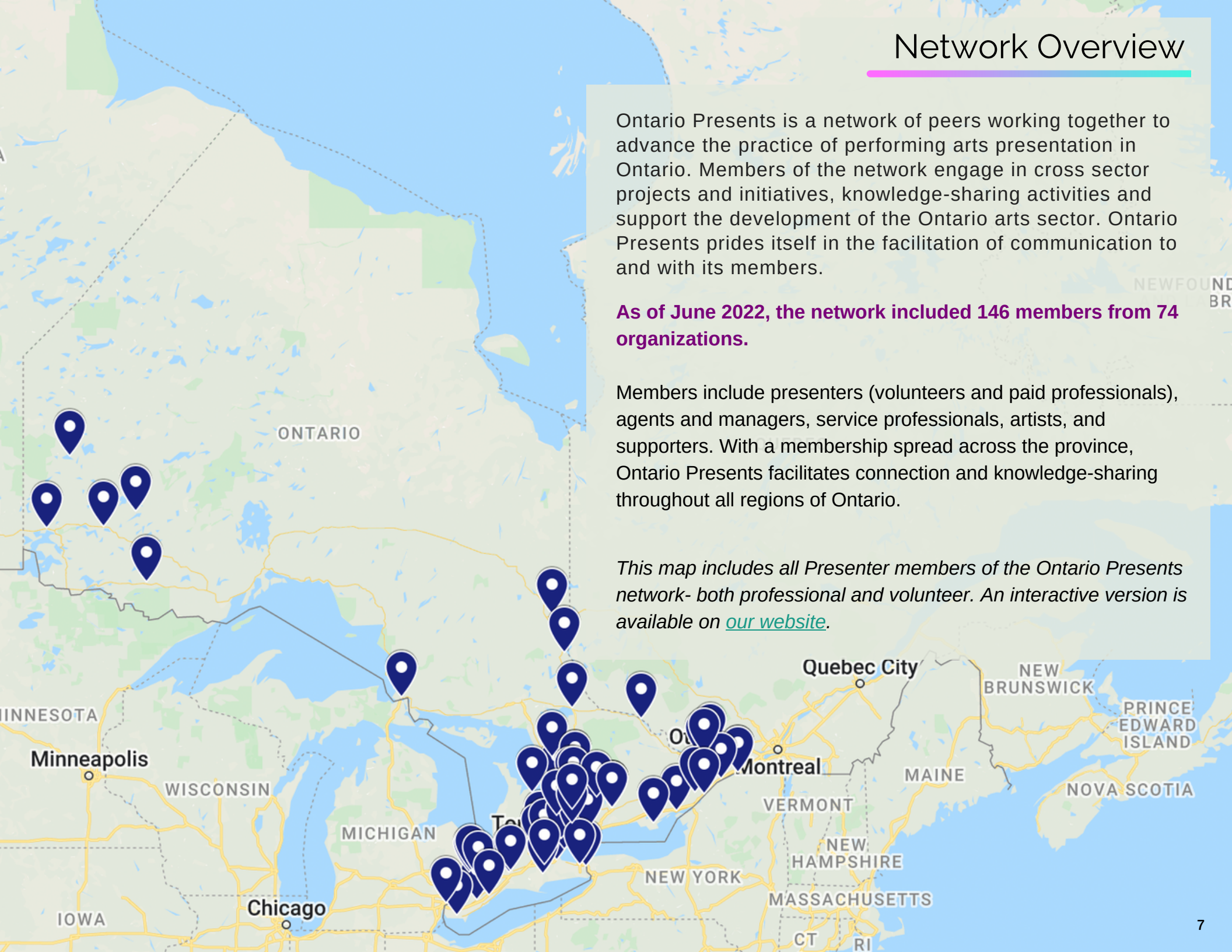
Network Overview

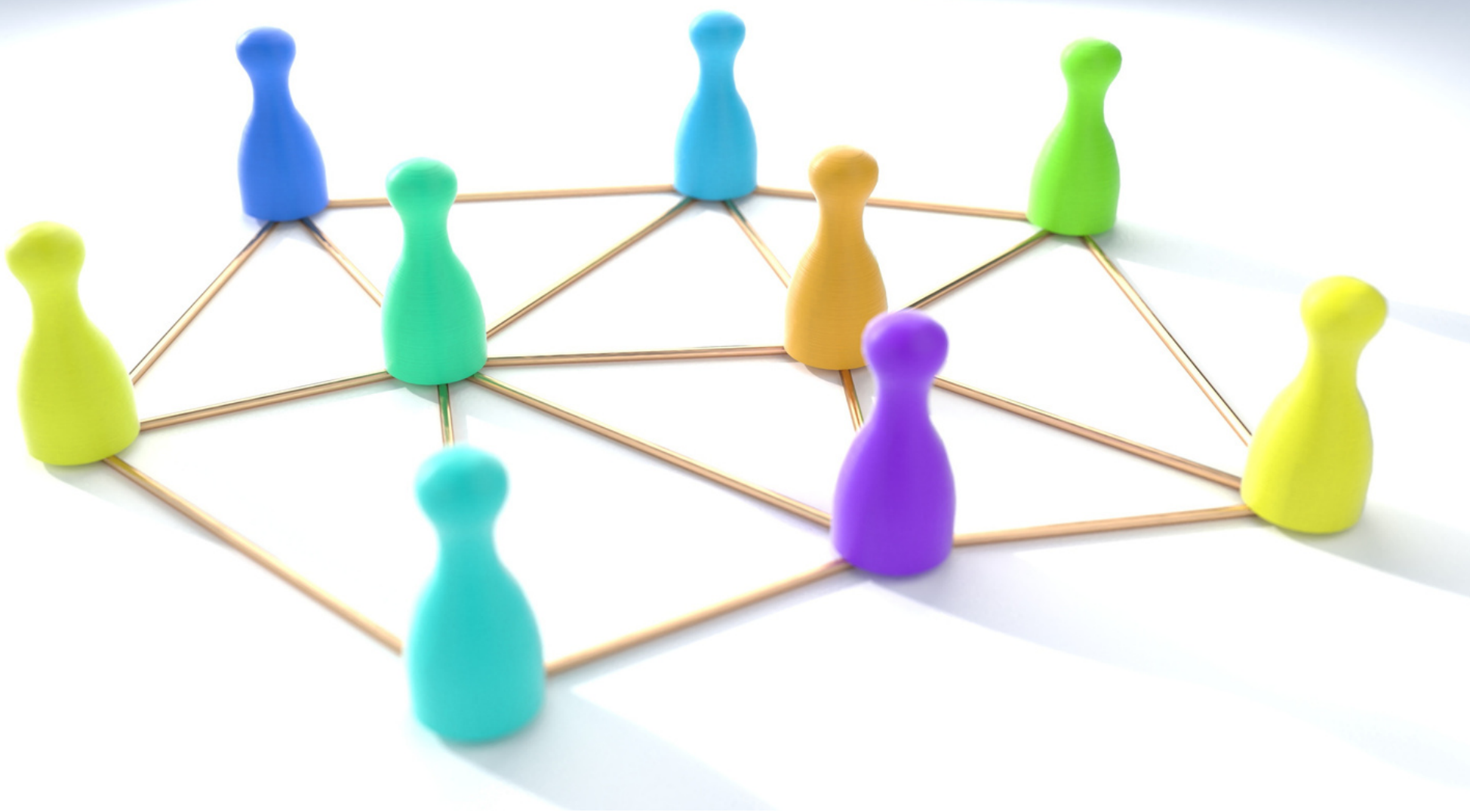
Ontario Presents is a network of peers working together to advance the practice of performing arts presentation in Ontario. Members of the network engage in cross sector projects and initiatives, knowledge-sharing activities and support the development of the Ontario arts sector. Ontario Presents prides itself in the facilitation of communication to and with its members.

As of June 2022, the network included 146 members from 74 organizations.

Members include presenters (volunteers and paid professionals), agents and managers, service professionals, artists, and supporters. With a membership spread across the province, Ontario Presents facilitates connection and knowledge-sharing throughout all regions of Ontario.

Network Updates

Ontario Presents continues to support the development of smaller networks within our presenting community, who collaborate informally and form communities of practice based on shared ways of working. These networks include the **Community Presenters Network**, the **Ontario Classical Music Network**, and the **Northern Volunteer Young Audience Network**. The networks have met regularly throughout the pandemic for both peer connection and sharing strategies for handling rescheduling, and reopening.



Advocacy & Sector Support Through the COVID-19 Pandemic

Ontario Presents has worked hard to collaborate with and provide support for our colleagues across the performing arts sector. We thank every member of our network, colleagues and friends for your perseverance, resilience, and dedication to the arts in the face of continuing challenges.

Our efforts continue to evolve as we adjust to *the new normal* and the needs of the sector. Collaborative efforts have included **bi-weekly meetings for Ontario presenters** to gather virtually and share information on reopening plans, financial supports, and more. We continue to **work with the Provincial Arts Service Organizations (PASO/OPSA)** coalition to share information and advocate for the arts in Ontario. OP's **email communications** have significantly increased to ensure that our network was well informed of all relevant information throughout the pandemic.

We are deeply grateful to our national counterpart, CAPACOA, and to all of the organizations and individuals who have worked incredibly hard to advocate for our sector. Our sincere thanks also to our colleagues in the PASO/OPSA coalition for their collaboration, and to governments at all levels for the financial support that have allowed our sector to persevere.

Equity Planning Action and Becoming a Witness Community

As you'll recall, OP began an equity planning journey several years ago in response to what we were learning from colleagues across the sector. In 2020-21, an equity project saw our staff and board of directors virtually engage IBPOC managers, artists, and presenters over a 6-month period, equally about 12 hours of difficult, exciting yet encouraging conversations. One of the greatest takeaways from that work, however, was to make what we were learning become internalized, consistent and routine in our conversations. The response to this was the hiring of our new Administrative Director.

With an Indigenous lens to help guide OP's equity action, we are now coordinating a governance and organizational review through an equity, diversity, inclusion, accessibility, and decolonization (EDIAD) lens. The key to this equity work is to inform change directly by and through the voices of equity-seeking individuals and communities. We have therefore actively ensured that Contact ONtour this year has been supported by both an Advisory Circle made up of IBPOC and Francophone voices, while the jury selection committee has also incorporated IBPOC voices and experiences.

To maintain connections with equity-seeking artists, agents and presenters guiding and leading what OP is, and can be, is now an instilled goal of the organization. **Taking on this goal now means that we are striving to role-model an equity action process for you our members to adopt and work through in your communities. Equity action work is a journey for the brave and fearful alike. It is about becoming great listeners and great learners.** It's a lot of work. But, to become a witness community, affords an opportunity for you and your communities to become witnesses to equitable changes to platform IBPOC artists, agents, and presenters from and for your audiences. Remembering that this work is not about the destination, but the journey is critical to finding success, in baby steps. We look forward to sharing in this journey for years to come.

In 2020, the Department of the Canadian Heritage, through funding from the Fresh Start program, provided the opportunity for Ontario Presents to award 15 **micro-grants to small, rural, and remote presenters to engage a local professional artist** to create projects with community participants that could welcome audiences back into presenting venues. With funding again provided by the Department of Canadian Heritage's Fresh Start program, Ontario Presents circulated a call for proposals in November 2021. **The call for proposals indicated that priority would be given to presenters and artists who identify as Indigenous, Black, or People of Colour, artists and presenters with disabilities, Deaf artists and presenters, and rural/remote communities.**

Eight projects were selected by an advisory committee in January 2022. These presenters and artists have started their community engagement projects and have participated in the ArtsEngage Learning Community from January until May 2022. **This year we were also able to provide additional funding for mentors for the projects as well as financial support to provide greater accessibility for participants.** The public presentations of the co-created works will be presented during the summer and fall of 2022.

Block Booking

Ontario Presents' block booking services provide presenting members with programming opportunities to book artists in partnership with other presenters. Block booking services also offer assistance with **tour coordination, contracting, and marketing/promotion.**

Block booked tours in 21/22 were severely limited by the pandemic, but, **18 artist tours** were still able to take place resulting in more than **\$400,000 in artist fees.**

The block booking coordinators worked hard to reschedule cancelled tours, as well as support new programming for 22/23. Through the work we've done in the past year in preparation for next season, we have **confirmed 54 tours** on behalf of **24 professional presenting organizations** and **14 volunteer presenters**, resulting in **more than \$3.6M in artist fees.**

This will result in **413 performances** scheduled in Ontario venues next season!

Theatre Connects is Ontario Presents' flagship curatorial development program, originally developed in partnership with the **Ontario Arts Council** as **Ontario Dances** and **Theatre Connects**, respectively. Ontario Presents has now **combined the two programs** into one that we are fully responsible for, seeking to develop audiences for theatre and dance work in communities outside of Toronto.

Despite the many restrictions of the past year, we were able to support participating presenters to bring a wide variety of theatre and dance to their communities in different ways, including many live performances. Presentations included **Tales of an Urban Indian** (*Talk is Free Theatre*), **The Mush Hole** (*Kaha:wi Dance Theatre*), and the **Spirit of Harriet Tubman** (*Leslie McCurdy*). The Registry hosted an eventful artist residency with **Rock Bottom Movement** who are developing **All Thespianz Go To Mars**.

Other funded projects that could not take place due to pandemic restrictions will take place next season, including **Prophecy Fog** (*Paper Canoe Projects*) and **No Woman's Land** (*Jaberi Dance Theatre*). This year's activities were supported by an OAC project grant.

Fresh Start: Theatre, Dance & TYA

Fresh Start is a suite of programs that OP is able to offer with the support of the Department of Canadian Heritage, with the aim of **supporting curatorial development for small, volunteer, and/or rural/remote presenters**. The ongoing projects that are currently part of Fresh Start are the **Northern Volunteer Young Audience Network**, the **Theatre Project**, and **Northern Dances**.

OP has continued to support these networks through the past year, providing opportunities for presenters to connect and share information, as well as direct assistance in rescheduling and planning presentations.

In lieu of our regular activities, a significant proportion of Fresh Start funding was directed to the ArtsEngage micro-grants and learning community, which supported presenters working with artists on community engagement projects across the province.

Thanks to a special grant from the Department of Canadian Heritage, we were able to launch a pilot project to support the **presentation of World Music Genres in communities outside of Toronto**. This program included workshops guided by **Alfredo Caxaj** (*Artistic Director of SunFest in London, ON*) and funding for a total of **14 concerts in spring 2022**. The concerts focused on IBPOC artists, including **OKAN, Tio Chorinho and Flavia Nascimento, Okavango African Orchestra, Kuné, QuiQue Escamilla, CimaFunk, Vox Sambou, Ammoye, and Sina Bathaie Ensemble**.

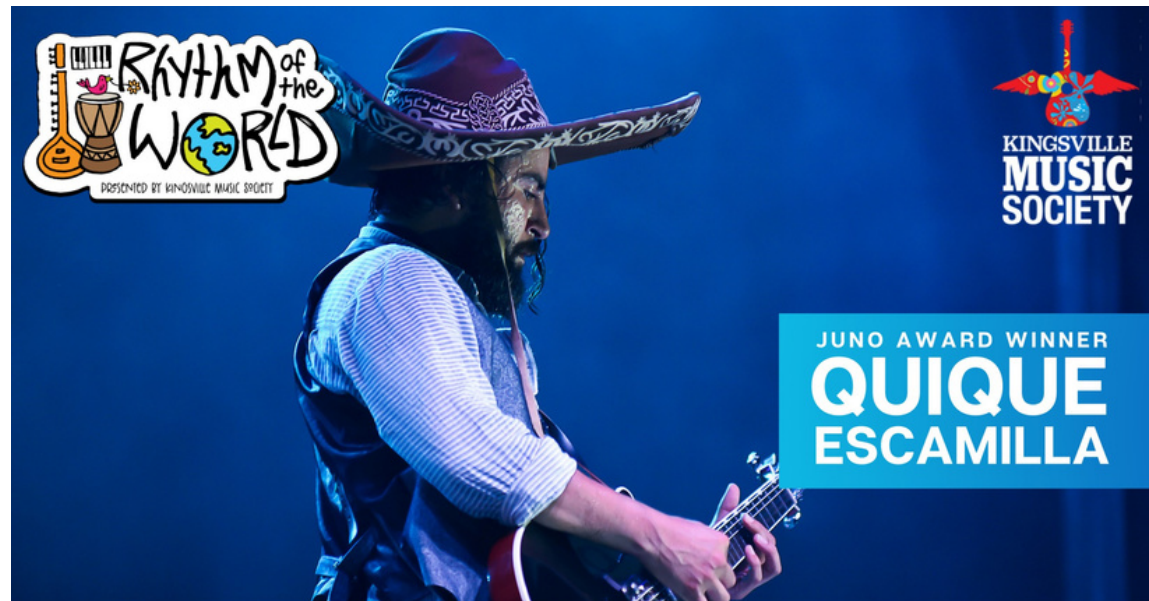

ONTARIO PRESENTS

For over 30 years, Ontario Presents has brought artists, agents, managers, presenters, and other industry representatives together for networking, showcases, and more at our annual conference. After cancelling the 2020 conference we felt it was critical to come together in 2021. We hosted our **first virtual conference**, gaining practical knowledge from the opportunity and necessity to take a different approach. This unexpected test of virtual approaches allowed us to identify ways we can expand the impact of Contact ONtour going forward. We will continue with **virtual Professional Development** and **One on One Conversations**. The showcasing and pitching artist produced high quality video presentations, doing their best to reach out to audiences - although this is an element we look forward to seeing in person! We will continue to produce a **digital on-line catalogue** including those artists who make it through to the final stage of our selection process.

To support the sector, registration fees to apply to showcase, as well as to attend the conference were greatly reduced, particularly for agents/managers and artists. The results can be seen in an increase in numbers this year- **130 presenters including reps from Alberta and BC; 40 agents/managers; 62 artists and 23 observers**. We continue to attract a significant number of artists to the conference as part of their personal and professional development. They have told us that they gain from connections made during the conference with other artists and agents as well as from our formal offerings.

Throughout the planning process for 2021, a number of focus groups were held with artists, agents and presenters. They were asked what they valued, what was missing, what they have gained from attending. These focus groups guided many of our decisions for 2021 and will continue to do so as we move into the 2023 conference.



Gathering Knowledge, Sharing Voices: Touring in the New Normal

This year, we launched a new pilot project to support **IBPOC dance and theatre artists** who are looking to learn about touring. Over the course of 4 months, artist mentors **Aria Evans** and **Nova Bhattacharya** led a cohort of **12 artists** in a peer learning process that included workshops on building relationships with presenters, contracts, tech riders, and marketing, all founded on an understanding of how artists can create agency for themselves in building a touring career. This program was based on past work we did in partnership with La danse sur les routes du Québec, **Barbara Kaneratonni Diabo**, and **Lee Bolton**.

Arts Touring Connector

The Arts Touring Connector is a digital platform we are developing to support presenter collaboration and the development of block booked tours. This platform will provide all the functionality of our previous block booking platform, blockbooking.ca, but with expanded functions to support more collaboration and better information-sharing. For the first time, it will also have an area for agent/managers and artists to access information about their own tours.

This platform is almost completely unique in the world, as is Ontario Presents' robust block booking program itself. We have developed it in partnership with the **Atlantic Presenters Association** (APA) and **CAPACOA**, and designed it so that other networks can continue to be added in order to continue growing the potential for presenter collaboration across borders. The platform has been under development for the past year and will be available for use starting September 2022.

This project is funded by the Canada Council for the Arts and the Department of Canadian Heritage.

OP continues to connect our members and the broader presenting sector through frequent and varied communication.

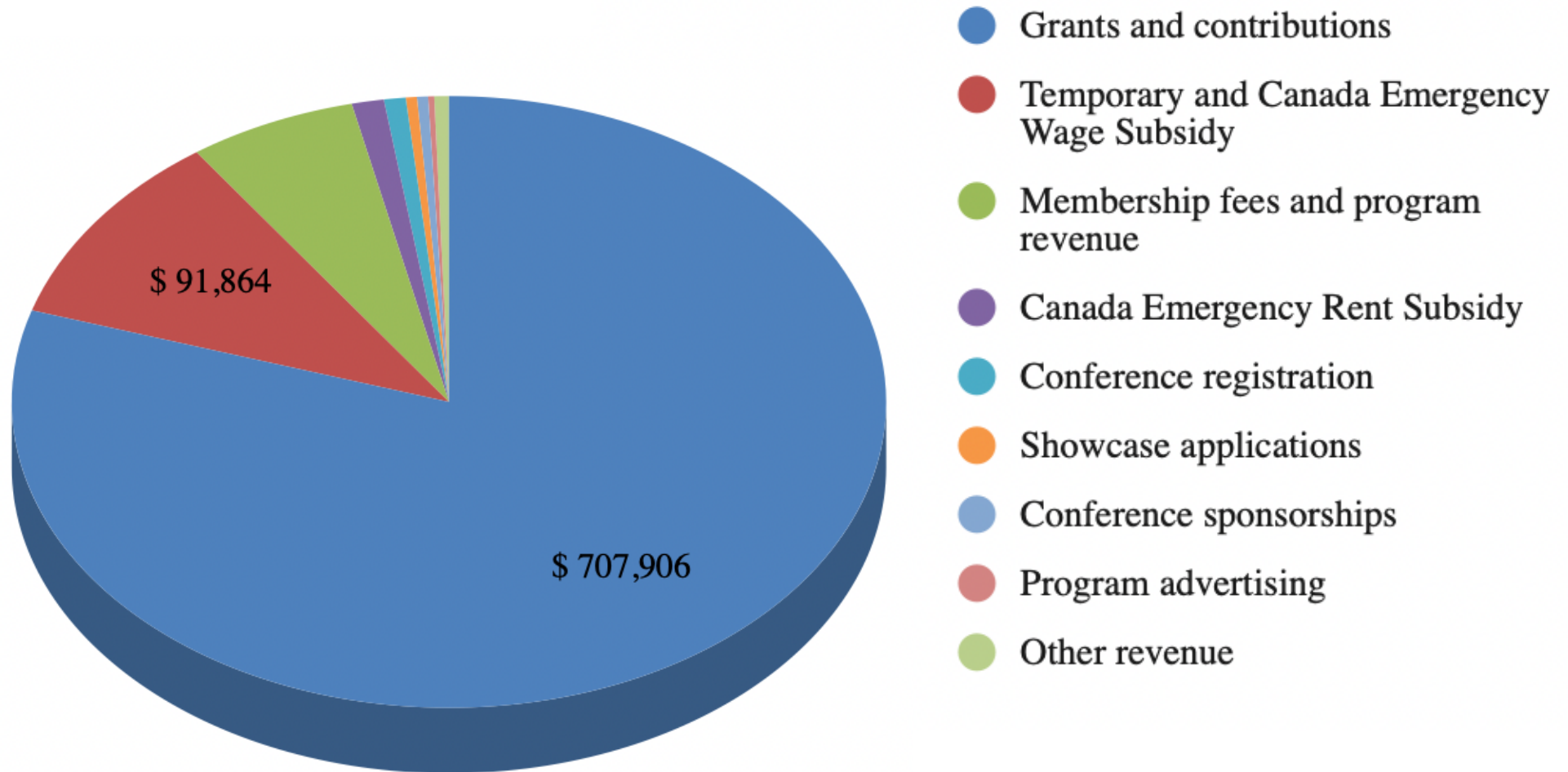
